A Message from the Executive Director



As we near the end of 2023, it seemed like the appropriate time to highlight our efforts at South Shore Arts to champion the arts, our arts community, and the quality of life in Northwest Indiana over the last twelve months. We've had significant achievements in several areas:

Creative Learning

Our art classes and workshops, covering a wide range of disciplines, rebounded strongly from the pandemic period and attracted students of all ages, genders, and walks of life. It has rejuvenated our Munster studios and Substation No. 9 in Hammond. In particular, our 2023 Summer Camps for youth were a hit and will be expanded in 2024. We've also introduced tailored programs for seniors, fostering lifelong learning and social engagement.

Youth Outreach

Our *everykid* program also made a strong comeback, serving nearly 4,000 first, second, and third grade students across our region. A major part of this initiative offers a free art and literacy-based learning experience, centered around inspiring children's books, with South Shore Arts Instructors conducting sessions in 139 classrooms. We provide books, art instructors, and art supplies, all at no cost to our local elementary schools.

Art Appreciation and Exhibitions

Our Art in Focus lecture series continued to draw a full house, featuring artist talks and appreciation lectures on famous artists like Francisco Goya and Norman Rockwell. Our gallery exhibitions showcased works from renowned artists, including Pulitzer Prize winner John H. White, our Outstanding Midwest Artist Series featured artist James Jankowiak, and many other national, regional and local talents.

Symphony Partnership

South Shore Arts' partnership with Northwest Indiana Symphony experienced a remarkable recovery. The South Shore Summer Music Festival in seven local communities attracted over 15,000 attendees. Ticket sales for the 22/23 Symphony Subscription Season saw a 42% increase, and the 23/24 season is off to a strong start. Our Symphony Chorus and Youth Orchestra programs have grown materially and are still open to new participants, offering an opportunity for those who love to sing or are students wishing to enhance their musical experiences.

Regional Arts Partnership

Through our role as Regional Arts Partner of the Indiana Arts Commission, we've substantially increased funding for local arts projects and organizations. The 2023/2024 Arts Organization Support and Arts Project Support grant programs have received over 60% more funding for our area, leading to a 33% increase in the number of grants awarded. This is a significant victory for our local arts community.

While we see a solid recovery in the arts over the last year, arts organizations like ours across the region and the country are still lagging from pre-pandemic levels of engagement and support. Smaller audiences and smaller budgets continue to limit the scope and scale of our arts community's exhibits, productions, and performances, also limiting the important and positive impacts that the arts provide.

You can help improve the quality of life in our region and help make our communities stronger by supporting the arts through charitable donations or by simply purchasing tickets for performances, concerts, and art exhibits. There are numerous opportunities throughout the year, as highlighted in our Regional Arts Calendar (southshoreartsonline.org/ regional-arts-calendar).



THE SONG THAT DOESN'T END

The South Shore Arts Outstanding Midwest Artist Series continues this season with a focus on Chicago artist James Jankowiak. *The Song That Doesn't End* is a survey of Jankowiak's work from the past ten years that will be on view at the Center for Visual & Performing Arts through January 6, 2024. The exhibit is curated by Linda Dorman and Tom Torluemke, who have worked closely with the artist, pulling together an exhibition that follows his career and dedicated exploration of color harmonies and rhythms of shapes through hard-edged abstraction.

Jankowiak is a Chicago-born artist and educator whose current paintings and installations focus on the role of color and familiar form as a means of communication in our day-to-day environment. His emotive abstract paintings and public artworks explore the intersections between color perception, visual rhythm, spirituality, and music.




Artist and art writer Pedro Velez says this of Jankowiak's work in an excerpt from the accompanying exhibit catalog:

"When I look at a James Jankowiak painting, I see music in harmonious color fields. I see the rhythm and uncontained sonic waves in lines expanding in unison. I see melodies forming electric outlines from within voluminous broad brush strokes. I see songs hugged by abstract clouds. Music moves our soul, but it can transport us outside our bodies to other realities no matter where we are located at that moment in time when we hear the melody. Jankowiak's paintings are like songs that carry us to ageless urban plazas with bustling streets and neon lights in cities by lakes, where cloud formations interweave nature with technology and culture."

For the past 20 years, Jankowiak has utilized his painting practice as a vehicle for social engagement with Chicago communities as a teaching artist embedded in Chicago Public Schools. Jankowiak integrates contemporary art into a social and emotional learning model for students and teachers alike, using accessible, collaborative art practices, focusing on the process of making public works in public spaces.

Jankowiak has received several grants and special commissions, including the Union Station Transit Center in the heart of Chicago, the Illinois Holocaust Museum's Family Youth Center, and the Chicago White Sox. He is currently working with the Department of Cultural and Special Events of the City of Chicago on a new permanent public artwork for the West Town Public Library on the Southwest Side of the city, where he has been a lifetime resident.

The public is invited to a free Artist Talk on Saturday, January 6, at 1pm.

Neighbors

Curated by Dorman + Torluemke January 19–March 16, 2024 Artist Reception: January 20, 2–5pm

Developing an idea for an exhibit rises through our experiences and consciousness as we explore artists locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally. The zeitgeist of our times is paramount to helping us decide the topics and themes we choose to work with. We seek to create a dialogue between the artists we are working with and layered meaning and intent in the works we exhibit to create a satisfying viewing and learning experience for our audience.

The exhibit curators state:

"Neighbors are everywhere, and our relationship with our neighbors is tenuous. Some of us have been lucky enough to have that perfect neighbor who became a lifelong friend, sharing milestones and the challenges of life and living—or the neighbor we never entirely understood or liked. Still, for years, we lived next to that person or family, peacefully and sometimes not so peacefully, coexisting. Neighbors is a group exhibition of work by eight Midwest artists who examine society and relationships within and the complex conditions that

color people's experiences. Highlighting figuration, it's about people we walk by or see from a distance or lend a helping hand. The purpose of the exhibition is to inspire an appreciation for the concept of neighbors from next door to other countries, continents, and beyond; we're all in this together."

An Art In Focus curator-led tour of the exhibit will be held on Monday, January 22, at 10am. An Artist Panel Discussion will be held on Saturday, February 17, from 1–3:30pm. A "Neighbor Stories" Community Night will be held on Thursday, March 7, at 6:30pm.





80TH ANNIVERSARY



South Shore Arts celebrated the 80th anniversary of the annual Salon Show, September 8 through November 4, 2023. This year's exhibit juror was artist, educator, and curator Ish Muhammad, an internationally exhibited artist who has called Northwest Indiana home for over three decades. Muhammad's artwork has been exhibited extensively throughout the Midwest, as well as the greater continental United States and abroad.

Of the over 400 works entered for this year's show, 49 artists and 60 pieces were selected. Over \$14,000 in prizes was awarded thanks to the generosity of longtime donors, including Tracy & Marc Schwimmer, who recently endowed their family's award in perpetuity, making the Renee and Sam Denmark the largest in the show.

This year also saw the addition of the Sandi Kozlowski Memorial Award, a \$2,023 award donated by the Kozlowski Family in honor of Sandi Kozlowski, a longtime supporter of South Shore Arts who headed the South Shore Arts exhibits committee for many years. Sandi's legacy will go on to shape South Shore Arts exhibits for decades to come.

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
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Local Arts Providers Receive Public Funding from the State of Indiana

South Shore Arts is proud to serve as the Region 1 Arts Partner of the Indiana Arts Commission (IAC), supporting arts organizations across Lake, Porter and LaPorte Counties. One of our most impactful activities in this capacity is to coordinate the IAC's Arts Organization Support (AOS) and Arts Project Support (APS) grant programs each year.

AOS grants are awarded in two-year cycles and are specifically for nonprofit arts organizations that have yearround arts programing. These grants provide unrestricted support for the overall operations of the awarded grantees. To engage more communities and a higher volume of smaller arts organizations this year, the IAC decreased the amount of annual cash revenue required of each applying organization from \$50,000 per year to \$20,000. This lower threshold provided for a much larger universe of arts organizations that could qualify and made for an even more competitive grant cycle. Despite the increased competitiveness, Region 1 had 18 arts organizations awarded AOS Grants for a total of almost \$200,000, a 75% increase in funding. Since AOS grants cover a two-year funding cycle, there will be no application period in 2024. The next application period will open in early 2025 with applications typically due in March.

APS grants are provided each year to arts and other local nonprofit organizations to support proposed artsrelated projects. For the fiscal year July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024, Region 1 had 31 APS grants awarded totaling \$119,680, a 60% increase in funding for our Region. 
